There are 14 Yukon First Nations. Of these, 11 are self-governing, meaning they each make laws and decisions on their Settlement Land and for their Citizens. The remaining 3 are governed by the *Indian Act*, which falls under federal jurisdiction.

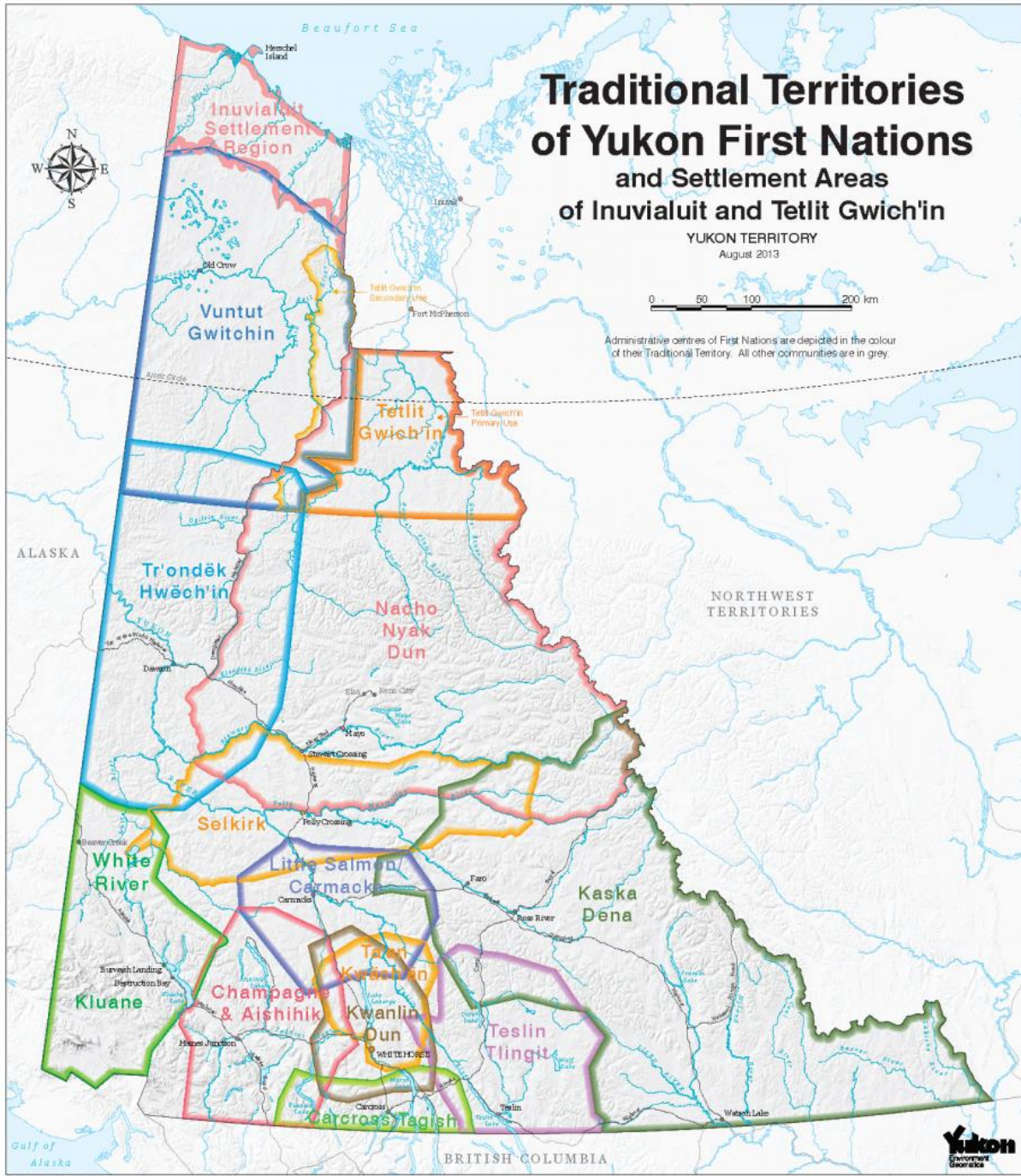
